





# **WALK OF A LIFETIME 2024**

#### Come Build a More Inclusive Future for Persons with Autism

More than 50,000 persons in Singapore have autism. And community support is crucial for some among them who will not be able to live independently and/or integrate into society.

Organised by St. Andrew's Autism Centre (SAAC), this year's Walk of a Lifetime (WOAL 2024) aims to drum up greater public engagement and inclusivity for persons with autism and their families. It will be held on 21 September (Sat), 9am to 12nn, at St. Andrew's Junior College and St. Andrew's Secondary School.

WOAL 2024 offers a bigger line-up of interactive and experiential activities that underline its three themes of *Understand*, *Accept*, and *Embrace*. Join us at our community celebration where friends, families, neighbours, co-workers and even corporates come together to honour persons with autism and extol their different, diverse abilities.

Leading the festivities is a five-station **learning journey**, where fun activities such as scavenger hunts, charades and sensory sensitivity corners give participants glimpses into the world of autism and its challenges.

Find out, among other things, why some individuals with

autism experience difficulties with two-way conversation and how others in the community can more **effectively interact** with them.



To up the fun further is **Make-Your-Own-Windmill**. Upon registration, participants receive a DIY kit, which they can assemble and decorate, then carry throughout the walk. As they cross the finishing line, participants proceed to "plant" their windmills in a "garden". **A symbol of hope and resilience**, the windmill aptly encapsulates SAAC's mission to enrich quality of life for our beneficiaries.


